GROUND BREAKING CONFERENCE AT DYNAMIC EARTH!

On March 3rd 2016 the Family Therapy Training Network hosted the ground-breaking conference 'Keeping the Family in Mind'. So it was rather appropriate that they chose Edinburgh's Dynamic Earth centre for the venue, where one of the exhibits enables you to experience the ground shuddering during a simulated volcanic explosion.

This special conference brought together trainees and supervision teams from the four foundation courses that were held across Scotland this year. These courses were funded by the Scottish Government to help families in diverse locations access extra support when they face challenges.

During the day teams of trainees and their supervisors presented different aspects of their work. There were fascinating presentations from the Crossreach team at Knox Academy who have been working with families in a school setting; the family counselling team at Bright Light Relationship Counselling (formerly Couple Counselling Lothian); and the family counseling team at The Spark in Glasgow.

There were also presentations from the Kibble Residential School, who are experimenting with systemic practice in residential care; Quarriers, who work with troubled families and young people; and the Children and Families Social Work team from Orkney.

It was inspiring to hear how each team was using their systemic ideas and training in different ways, and connecting with different client groups. Managers of the different teams also talked about their experiences, and the benefits and challenges of developing systemic practice within their various contexts.

This has been a busy and exciting year for family therapy in Scotland. The training project has been very effective in raising the profile of family therapy in several key locations, and with both non-statutory and statutory services. The training has also changed the thinking and practice of the trainees, as well as their managers and organisations.
